Prof. Karamanski will be speaking on the important history of Native Americans in Chicago, including the North Side, where Rogers Ave. was a significant border in the history of treaties as they were pushed ever westward. Edgewater was also the site of seasonal village settlements when Kenmore and Winthrop were wetland swales for harvesting wild rice.

Theodore Karamanski is a Professor of History and Public History Director at Loyola University Chicago. He is an expert in early history of the upper Midwest, as well as maritime history, and is the author of several books, including two on the history of Chicago in the Civil War. He has been a popular speaker in the past in Edgewater and Rogers Park.
